PUPPY RAISERS' ANSWERS TO FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Behind every mobility service dog is an excellent, caring Puppy Raiser who gives their time, love, and resources so that a Disabled Handler can know the freedom of functional independence.

Preparing a valuable puppy to become a potential mobility service dog is an important responsibility that takes serious consideration. We have been utilizing Puppy Raisers and Co-Raisers situations -working nicely too!

We are honored to be on this journey with you as you find your cadence learning about becoming a Puppy Raiser. We are here to assist you along the way. Please read through some answers to commonly asked questions.

What Is So Special about MobilityDog?

People come for a Service Dog, but you get a community! At MobilityDog, building a strong community helps sustain our community members and strengthens their ability to move into the world confidently. We also believe that our strong community provides a safe place for our community members to interact and grow, support each other as we work together, educate others, and advocate for people with disabilities.

To support our members and educate them about training their Service Dogs daily, solving challenges they face, and teaching them about their rights as they step out into the world, we hold weekly Puppy Meetups every Tuesday from 12:15-1:15 pm PT. We count on all of our Puppy Raisers and Handlers to attend these meetups so they can learn for themselves and support others in our community. We train in person the First Saturday of each month 10 am to 2:30 pm with a catered picnic lunch between Brookside Park near Kidspace in Pasadena and Huntington Central Park in Huntington Beach. It is a fabulous time to be in person, experience many distractions, and train with all our service dog and service dog in training teams.

We also ask our Raisers and Handlers to participate by posting a minimum of 3 times a week to our Facebook Group page so we can all see what everyone is up to. We especially love to see pictures and videos.

We highly value confidentiality: we feel strongly that each person's past and ongoing story is their own to tell. We share only when the person permits us to share.



How old will my puppy be?

The puppies are just turning 8 weeks old when they meet their Puppy Raisers.

How will I get my puppy?

You will be responsible for picking up your puppy at 8 weeks from MobilityDog's generous breeder or in Pasadena, CA, and delivering it back to MobilityDog in Pasadena or to MobilityDog's Service Dog Trainer in Claremont, CA.

What will my puppy already know how to do?

Your puppy will have been raised using the Puppy Culture Method from birth to 8 weeks. This method exposes the puppies to all sorts and ages of people, vibrations, sounds, sights, textures and obstacle course items to climb on, through, and over. The puppies are nearly potty trained and crate trained. They are ready to walk on a loose leash as they begin basic obedience.

What are my duties as a Puppy Raiser?

Your goal as a Puppy Raiser is to socialize your SDiT and raise an independent, confident dog, comfortable being in crowds, around all sorts of people, animals, around all sorts of distractions, and also alone, without separation anxiety and comfortable being alone in a crate or outdoor area to entertain itself and explore and create activities on its own.

What are MobilityDog's Rights of all Canines?

MobilityDog is committed to the best environment for each dog. We are committed to each dog's general health, wellness, treatment, welfare, and the basic rights of each canine gifted to us from rescues and breeders and poodles that 'show up' to become our responsibility. We will provide each dog with their fundamental rights to food, safe and secure shelter, water, exercise, veterinarian care, humane and gentle training, space to be a terrific, fun-loving dog, and loving care. We hold wellness checks, weekly puppy meetups, weekly training sessions, and are hands-on. As a top priority, we will always have the well-being of our Service Dogs in Training, Service Dogs, and all the dogs we encounter. More here

Our Goals for Our Puppy Raisers are to develop dogs that are

Well-behaved- The pups have good house manners and will not relieve in the house.
They are quiet and calm, eat only their own food, and are not destructive. They have
taken basic Obedience Training and received their AKC-S.T.A.R., Canine Good Citizen
(CGC), Canine Good Citizen Advanced (CGCA), Canine Good Urban (CGCU).
MobilityDog will cover these expenses.



- 2. Socialized to the world- The pups have been exposed to a wide variety of people, places, and things and accept new situations in a calm manner. Puppies are comfortable and well-behaved in restaurants, grocery stores, parks, schools, libraries, malls, museums, concerts, plays, parties, weddings, volunteering, loud and quiet, and among children and adults- essentially all day-to-day life. They are expected to have full access, 24/7 with their puppy raisers.
- 3. **Well-traveled-** The puppies are relaxed and comfortable when traveling in all modes of transportation: cars, vans, buses, trains, airplanes, ferries, boats, bicycles, cable cars, subways, etc.
- 4. **People friendly-** The pups bond well with people, enjoy receiving verbal praise, and are eager to please.
- 5. **Animal-friendly-** The pups are calm and appropriate around all animals they might come in contact with, including dogs, cats, birds, horses, and livestock.
- 6. **Responsive-** The pups obey basic commands and cooperate during various training exercises. They have great manners, never barking or drawing attention to themselves. They respond to words and hand signals.
- 7. **Etiquette trained-** The pups have been exposed to proper manners in public for tucking under the table while their Handler dines, sidewalk relieving, professional appointments, hotels, in the workplace, shopping in all kinds of shops and grocery stores, everywhere you go.
- 8. **ShiShi-** Relieve themselves on a leash wherever asked. Teach to go on all surfaces... more here

In order to accomplish this, you will take your dog everywhere with you: on daily "field trips" to stores and businesses, parks and entertainment venues, etc. The goal is to expose the puppy to all of life's adventures: people, animals, noises, modes of transportation, stairs, and elevators. The puppy is to be at your side as it learns to live as an extension of your body, as it will for its future mobility handler, balanced equally with playfulness and just being a dog. They are dogs and must run and play games and have doggie fun every day. A happy dog makes the best, well-adjusted Service Dog in Training.

What comes with my Puppy?

42" crate, dog bed, toys, collar(s), soft harness, leashes, training tools, seat belt, PVC dowels for soft retrieval, balls, bell, light button, and great support from MobilityDog! It takes a village!

Will I receive training from MobilityDog?

MobilityDog provides its Puppy Raisers with a full Puppy Manual, which includes what to do when, expectations at various developmental stages, training skills, and how to care for your dog with accompanying reference materials and training videos. MobilityDog's Certified Service Dog Trainer(s) meet with you the First Saturday of every month between Brookside Park in



Pasadena and Huntington Central Park in Huntington Beach starting at 3 months of age and continuing for the duration of its time with you.

MobilityDog expects you to sign up for Obedience and Etiquette classes with an organization in your community. (PetCo and PetsMart have acceptable classes.) You will work to pass these tests: the AKC S.T.A.R., the Canine Good Citizen (CGC), the Canine Good Citizen Intermediate (CGCI), and the Canine Good Citizen Urban (CGCU). After the Service Dog in Training (SDiT) transitions to its Handler, the two of them will take the Public Access Test with Tasking (PAT+T).

How long will the puppy be with me?

The puppy will transfer from you to the Certified Service Dog Trainer (CSDT) when the puppy is 18 to 21 months old. The CSDT will work with the dog to learn the specific assistance skills that the dog will need to help its disabled handler.

Who owns the puppy?

MobilityDog is the sole owner of the puppy during the time it is with its Puppy Raiser.

What are my financial obligations?

MobilityDog will pay for vaccines, neutering/spaying, and **preapproved** routine or emergency veterinary care necessary to maintain the health and well-being of the SDiT. We supply dog food and some treats, which Raiser picks up on the First Saturday Picnic & Training each month. Also, we supply the tools they need for training.

Raisers are asked to donate the financial obligations and responsibilities of the grooming expenses every six weeks, toys, and appropriate housing. We ask that Raisers keep all invoices and expenses while raising and submit them to MobilityDog at the end of their time with the dog for a tax write off.



Raisers are asked to be actively involved in fundraising annually with video sharing of their raising experiences. They will be provided with assistance in the form of letters, flyers, and events. Social media posts assist with funds.
